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Total Communication Topic- Easy Read Information

This month's **Total Communication Topic** focuses on the importance of **easy read** materials for those with a communication disability or difficulty.

The government's Accessible Communication Formats guidelines, published in 2014 are available at <https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/inclusive-communication/accessible-communication-formats> and state that 'People with learning disabilities need access to all information, not just disability-specific information but also about their health, voting, work and gaining skills.' Using an easy read format can help to provide individuals with important information that affects them and can support individuals in making decisions about their care and day to day life.

Top Tips

Use easy words, short sentences and simple punctuation. Avoid jargon.



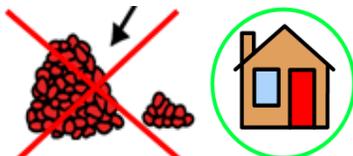
Use larger font (at least 12 point), a clear typeface (eg Comic Sans) and plenty of spacing.



Use photos, symbols and drawings to support the text. The subject of the material should be clear at a glance, even to a non-reader.



Use bullet points or text boxes to make the main points clear.



Do not rely on abstract symbols. Use one or two simple symbols or photographs to the left of the words.

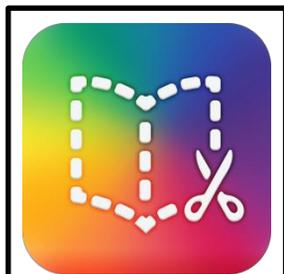

The full version allows you to make unlimited books for £3.99. Completed books can be viewed in iBooks, shared to other iPads and emailed.

This Month's Signs

Make a 'C' with thumb and fore finger and tap chin twice.



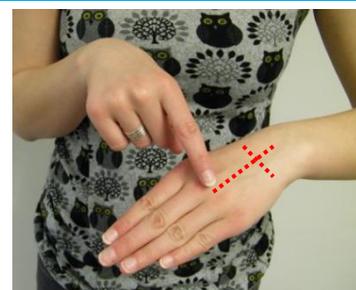
Flower
